Bagshot is a town situated in the northwest corner of *Surrey*.

Bagshot prospered due to its position on the main *London* to the *West Country* road (*The Great South West Road*). As with many villages on main coaching routes, *Bagshot* developed services, inns for the stagecoach passengers, and stables to provide the coaches with fresh horses.

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This view shows an inn on *Bagshot Heath*. Rowlandson's party would have probably travelled this road to the south of *England*.



Winchester Cross.

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The *Butter Cross* (also known as the *Winchester Cross*, the *City Cross* and the *Market Cross*) in *Winchester High Street*. The *Butter Cross* is a holy cross, dating back to the mid-fourteenth century.

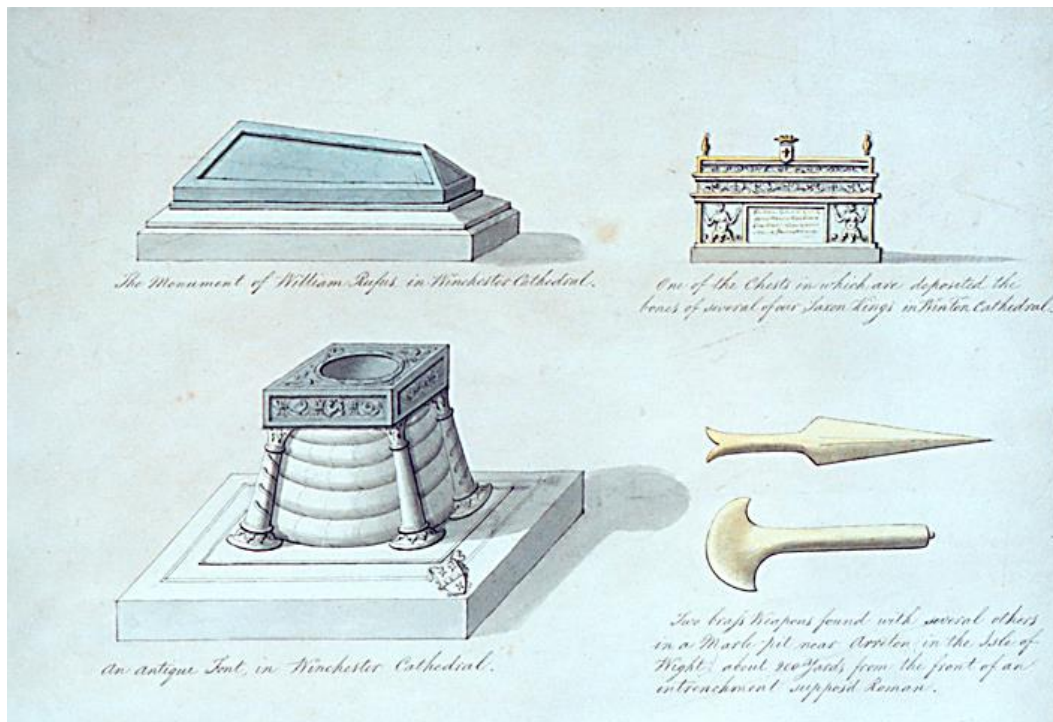
This shows the *Westgate* looking eastwards into the city. A small part of the medieval church of *St Mary-in-the-Ditch* is showing just to the left of the smaller of the two arches.

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Cheyney Court is a picturesque *Elizabethan* timber-framed building next to the *Cathedral Close* gate. With its towering gables and leaded windows, it once served as the *Bishop of Winchester's* courthouse.



Antiquities from Winchester Cathedral.

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These antiquities from *Winchester Cathedral* have all been identified and include a tomb possibly that of *William Rufus*; a wooden tomb-chest, constructed by *Bishop Fox* and known as '*Fox's Box*'; and a 12th-century *Tournal* marble font.

The two weapons are from the *early Bronze Age Arreton Down hoard*, found on the *Isle of Wight*.
