		With regards to energy, how self-sufficient is the IOW? How much further do			
		we need to go to be self-sufficient? I have struggled to get a simple view on where we are today and how we are going to get there in the future.			
		<ul> <li>Currently there is about 92MW of solar energy capacity on the Island and about 3MW of other renewable sources</li> </ul>			
		These generated 113,822.8 MWh in 2020 (enough to power about			
		30,000 average UK homes for one year)			
		30MW anticipated from PTEC tidal development			
		To be self-sufficient, as much as 300MW capacity would be needed			
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This depends on how far electrification goes and population growth in the coming years In terms of energy used, Island electricity consumption fell from 625 GWh in 2005 to 539 GWh in 2018 However is likely to increase over time as we switch to electrification, e.g. move away from gas boilers A target of being self-sufficient in electricity from renewable sources by 2020 was/is noted on the iow.gov website? Was this achieved? This was not achieved largely due to grid capacity issues. Owing to the need for a fourth interconnector with the mainland, developers have been put off because of the additional cost required to connect to the grid and export excess energy back to the mainland. The council and partners are currently working with SSEN on potential options to overcome this and the self-sufficiency target has been restated within last year's Climate Strategy. We will provide updates as the work progresses How much energy is generated on the Island? Green vs Oil/Gas generated? Capacity includes about 95mw of renewables – largely solar (just over 0.5MW on council buildings as part of Salix projects) Cowes Power Station has maximum capacity of 140MW. It runs on light fuel oil (a type of diesel?) and uses 762 litres a minute when it is running at full capacity – however, it doesn't get used all that regularly. Cowes Power Station annually runs at about 1% of time and this energy is almost 100% sent to the mainland to strengthen the south eastern The rest of the Island's energy currently comes from the mainland Unfortunately I haven't been able to find any specific figures around exactly how much Cowes is used year-on-year other than the 1% figure, but I will keep looking around and provide an update when I hear more. How much longer will these meetings be online/remote? This format does exclude those who wish to come but do not have the technology. Meetings will remain online for the time being but with restrictions ending we will discuss options and look to a hybrid approach to be introduced later this year. Many of the issues that people at this forum care passionately about, e.g. tree cover, biodiversity, pollution, etc. are undermined by the lack of enforcement. Unscrupulous developers know this and take advantage. Will this be addressed so that the message gets around that people cannot destroy the natural world for the sake of personal financial gain? Larger fines could offset the cost perhaps? Please could you send me any further information (via the Sustainability inbox) about any issues you have seen arise, or if you see any new issues arise? I will need some further time to answer this in full in terms of what could be done about stricter enforcement as this goes beyond my role.
