The Aims, Objectives and Expected Outcomes:

The Aftercare – Section 117 Mental Health Act 1983 policy is an updated joint policy between the Isle of Wight NHS Trust and the Isle of Wight Council and has been officially agreed by both.

The policy provides a framework for the discharge of the responsibilities of health and social care to provide aftercare for entitled patients. The overall aim of this policy is to promote the recovery and rehabilitation of patients with severe mental disorders and applies equally to all patients entitled to aftercare.

The service is provided to any clients who have been detained under long term provisions of the Mental Health Act. This policy will include anything necessary to meet patients' immediate health and social care needs arising from the mental disorder for which they have been detained, to support them to cope with life outside the hospital and avoid readmission.

This policy applies equally to all mental health patients entitled to after-care. The decision to update the existing policy is to ensure effective discharge of statutory duties.

The service is provided to any clients who lack mental capacity and this policy will provide better patient care and comply with statutory duty.

Evidence Considered During Screening

People have different needs and experiences in all impact area groups. The Aftercare S117 MHA 1983 policy does not differentiate. The policy is applied within wider Community care policies, which are based on personalization, individual assessment of needs and care planning. This should ensure that people's varying needs are addressed and that there is no discrimination on basis of protected characteristics.

People who have not been sectioned, may have the same needs as someone who has been detained are not entitled to aftercare and are therefore disadvantaged. They have to pay for services provided, whereas others get them free and without being subject to FACS.

Those who have been sectioned could argue to be more disadvantaged than other disabled people. The law and this policy seek to redress that disadvantage, whilst at the same disadvantaging others. The Council are being fair to all.
