Charging Policy for Residential and Nursing Care Adult Social Care Services

This Policy has been updated to reflect the current changes in the Care Act 2014. The requirements of the Care Act state that the Local Authority must have a separate charging policy for residential and nursing care services and also one for those services provided *not* in a care home setting, i.e. non-residential services. This policy has been updated to comply with this requirement and the policy has been written in accordance with the Care and Support Statutory Guidance and Regulations.

The previous April 2015 policy was refreshed during an annual review in May-August 2016 and it was agreed to update with the August 2016 version.

The Aims, Objectives and Expected Outcomes:

Many individuals currently supported by the council receive services in a residential or nursing care setting. Their needs have been agreed with them as a result of an assessment of need for eligible care and support.

The council will require the client to make a financial contribution subject to their ability to pay and this policy covers these circumstances.

Evidence Considered During Screening

The Care Act 2014 (sections 14, 17 and 69-70), the Care and Support (Charging and Assessment of Resources) Regulations 2014 and the Care and Support Statutory Guidance (chapter 8) give local authorities a discretionary power to charge adult recipients of residential or nursing care services such amounts as they consider reasonable. However in assessing a service user, local authorities must ensure that a person's income is not reduced below a specified level after charges. This is the set Personal Expense Allowance (PEA) amount as defined by the regulations. However, this is only a minimum and local authorities have discretion to set a higher level if they wish.

The Isle of Wight Council Community Wellbeing and Social Care Directorate have developed this charging policy on the basis of equity, need and a duty to provide care.

This policy aims to be fair and implementation should not lead to anyone being unfairly disadvantaged. If a client feels that this policy does not treat them fairly, they can ask for a review of their assessment.
