## Name of Policy/Strategy/Service/Function Proposal

Recharge Agreement with the IW NHS Trust relating to Cross Solent Travel Scheme funded by the Isle of Wight Council to fund travel costs for NHS patients travelling to the mainland for chemotherapy, radiotherapy or renal dialysis.

## The Aims, Objectives and Expected Outcomes:

Until 2005 the Island's Health Services operated a discretionary scheme and provided funding to reimburse people for cross Solent travel where they were required to attend mainland appointments for Radiotherapy, Chemotherapy or Renal Dialysis. Where people have low income or are in receipt of specific qualifying benefits or allowances the NHS has a statutory duty to reimburse their travel costs through the Healthcare Travel Cost Scheme (Travel Expenses and Remission of Charges) Regulations 2003 (HTCS), but the discretionary scheme went beyond this statutory duty and provided reimbursement that was not means tested.

In 2005, the NHS made a decision to withdraw the discretionary scheme that reimbursed people who were not eligible to claim for their travel costs under the HTCS. It was at this time that Isle of Wight Council members expressed a commitment to assist local residents with the cost of travelling to the mainland for treatment when the NHS ceased to provide this support.

Since 2006 the council has funded the discretionary scheme through a recharge agreement with the NHS Trust. The council currently fund foot passenger fares allowing patients who are not in receipt of the qualifying benefits to access the statutory HTCS, to still claim these expenses back. This can also include the cost of a carer/escort foot passenger fare where the patient is over 65 years of age or under the age of 18.

The council currently provides Adult Social Care with £60,000 per year to support this discretionary scheme. The Isle of Wight Council's decision to provide this funding makes us

nationally unique as no other local authority chooses to fund transport for NHS patients and there is no duty or responsibility placed on local authorities to do so.

The Council is considering whether or not it should continue to fund this cross Solent travel for two reasons:

First, in such challenging financial times, the council must take very difficult decisions in how it can best meet its duties and responsibilities despite the significant reduction in funding from Government.

Second, the council is also concerned about the inequitable nature of this funding. It only supports those local residents who are travelling for a restricted range of treatments (chemotherapy, radiotherapy or renal dialysis), meaning that those people who have to undergo cross Solent travel to attend a mainland hospital for an equally serious illness or life-saving treatment receive no financial support from the Council.

Accordingly, the funding of this scheme was identified as a potential budget saving for 2018/19. However, the council recognizes the importance of hearing and considering the views of Island residents to inform any decisions about the future funding of this discretionary scheme and it is therefore going out to public consultation using an independent partner to administer the consultation and analyse the results.

## The Healthcare Travel Cost Scheme (HCTS)

The Healthcare Travel Cost Scheme (HTCS) is part of the NHS Low Income Scheme, and was set up to provide financial assistance to those patients who do not have a medical need for ambulance transport, but who require assistance with their travel costs. Under the scheme, patients on low incomes or receiving qualifying benefits or allowances are reimbursed in part or full for costs incurred in travelling to receive certain NHS services, where their journey meets certain criteria.

The expected outcomes are that patients on low incomes under the NHS Low Income Scheme (LIS) or receiving other qualifying benefits that meet the HTCS eligibility criteria will continue to be fully supported or partly supported through the (HTCS) Healthcare Travel Costs Scheme

To qualify for help with travel costs under the HTCS, you must meet three conditions:

- 1. At the time of your appointment, you or your partner (including civil partners) must be receiving one of the qualifying benefits or allowances, or meet the eligibility criteria of the NHS Low Income Scheme.
- 2. Your journey must be made to receive NHS-funded non-primary medical or non-primary dental care services, to which you have been referred to by a GP, dentist or hospital consultant.
- 3. For referrals made by a primary practitioner such a GP or dentist, the service must be provided on a different day and in premises other than those occupied by the

practitioner who made the referral.

Patients will be able to claim an automatic refund for their travel from the cashier's office at the hospital they attend and must provide proof that they are in receipt of the eligible benefits. ## Cross Solent Travel Discounts provided by the ferry companies

## Red Funnel:

Red Funnel's scheme provides discounted foot passenger travel to eligible Isle of Wight residents who have an NHS medical appointment in Southampton. A special return passenger ferry fare is available for the patient and one person travelling with them. Where the patient is a child, the discounted fare is available for up to 2 adults travelling with the child. Please note the fare only applies to sailings from East or West Cowes after 8:45am (exceptions may be made for earlier appointments).

#### Wightlink:

Wightlink offers 50% ferry discounts exclusively for Isle of Wight residents travelling to the mainland for an NHS-funded hospital appointment. 50% Discounts apply to Standard, Economy and Foot passenger fares for IOW residents.

50% discount applies to IOW Residents; Economy and Standard fares.

Discount only applies to patient + 1 (with the exception of children where two parents will be permitted to travel) travelling under an NHS funded appointment.

## **Hover Travel**:

Offers a reduction in the cost of foot passenger travel on Hovertravel's passenger services for patients attending NHS appointments on the mainland. The scheme provide patients attending NHS appointments at mainland hospitals, and one person travelling with them, with a discounted return fare between Ryde and Southsea and also provide a free connection (saving £2.40 per person) using the HoverBus from Southsea Esplanade to the bus terminus at The Hard, Portsmouth.

## Free Onward Travel to Hospital Appointments:

### Southampton

Free Mini Bus to Southampton General Hospital – provided by Wessex Cancer Trust The Daisy Bus service operates between the Red Jet Ferry to Southampton General Hospital and Jurys Inn specifically for people coming over to the hospital from the Isle of Wight.

### Portsmouth

Free Minibus to QA Hospital – provided by Wessex Cancer Trust Dedicated bus service which runs between the Hover Travel terminal at Southsea and Portsmouth's Queen Alexandra Hospital, Cosham.

This EIA seeks to measure the impact of changing or ceasing the council's current funding of cross Solent travel for people who do not qualify for support from the NHS statutory Healthcare Travel Scheme they are travelling for chemotherapy, radiotherapy or renal dialysis.

#### **Scope of the Equality Impact Assessment**

Current funding of £60,000 per annum supported 253 patients to travel to the mainland to receive chemotherapy, radiotherapy or renal dialysis during 2017/18. In addition, companions and carers were also supported to travel with the patient in a proportion of these cases.

The council has recognized the importance of hearing and considering the views of Island residents to inform any decisions about the future funding of this scheme and is therefore embarking on a public consultation using Healthwatch IW as an independent partner to administer the consultation and analyse the results.

## **Analysis and assessment**

The IW Council are working closely with the NHS Trust and the ferry companies to improve the patients travel experience. This work is part of the broader multi agency work being undertaken to consider cross Solent travel arrangements for Island residents as part of the Acute Service Redesign and other Local Care Board work streams. Better promotion of available options to obtain a refund for travel if appropriate or a discounted ferry cost is being developed. These schemes are now well promoted via the development of new leaflets and on the CCG website.

Frontline staff located within the council's information, advice and guidance centre and across the NHS Trust are aware of the NHS Healthcare Travel Cost Scheme and cross Solent travel discounts and are able to provide assistance and signposting to the most appropriate help.

Risks have been identified as follows:

Removal of the council funding for this scheme could result in people being unable to undertake lifesaving treatments.

Consultation may deliver an expectation from the public that the current scheme should be made more equitable by expanding it to support a wider range of health conditions, which would not be financially viable.

#### Recommendations

It is recommended that we progress to full public consultation to enable the council to make an informed decision about the future funding of this travel scheme. Stage 2 of the EIA will be updated once the responses have been received.
