Subsequent meetings will be monthly, to be confirmed at this first meeting. (Bus fare can be refunded. If own transport is used, refunded to the value of the equivalent bus fare. If bus service or alternative is not available, taxi may be provided)

Introduction

Would you like to become a Youth Councillor or UK Member of Youth Parliament and help make changes that will benefit young people on the Isle of Wight?

What is the Isle of Wight Youth Council?

The Isle of Wight Youth Council is a group of up to 30 young people aged between 11 and 21 years, resident on the Island. Additionally other young people can be invited to join the group. The Youth Council will elect its own Chairman, Deputy Chairman, Secretary, and Communications Officer and will be supported by an Isle of Wight Council Officers.

The purpose of the Isle of Wight Youth Council (IWYC) is to work on behalf of young people of the Isle of Wight, in co-operation with the Isle of Wight Council, to increase young people's influence over issues and decisions, which concern young people.

What is a Member of Youth Parliament?

Members of Youth Parliament (MYPs) are elected in every part of the UK. There are currently hundreds of MYPs. You need to be aged between 11 and 18 to be a Member of the Youth Parliament.

Once elected MYPs may get involved in a variety of issues by meeting with the Island's MP and local councilors, taking part in campaigns and debates, making speeches and ensuring the views of young people are listened to by decision makers.

The most important aspect of any MYP's job is to make sure they represent the views of the young people in their constituency. Any MYP can set up a campaign, and any young person can support it and make a difference.

What experience do you need?

You don't need any experience to become an Isle of Wight Youth Councillor or MYP. You just need:

- Passion
- Commitment
- •A desire to make a difference to young peoples' services
- The ability to listen to all young people
- •To be able to communicate with a wide variety of people
- Have ideas about what can be done

What is involved in being a Youth Councillor or MYP? You need to attend regular meetings and training events as follows:

- Attendance at meetings
- Isle of Wight Council Committee meetings as required.
- Training events and conferences as appropriate.
- Listen to young people on the Island;
 You will need to meet with and talk to young people. Most importantly, you will need to listen to the opinions of young people, even those who you would not normally talk to.
- Represent the views of young people. Your views are important, but you will also have to represent other young people and their views, even if you don't agree with them.
- Ensure the representation of those young people who have been excluded from school.

- Some young people are not able to put their views across very well.
 This may be because of a disability, a language barrier or just not
 being able to find the right words. It is your job to speak up for
 everyone.
- When attending meetings or representing the Youth Council, or in the role of MYP, you will be in a position of authority. You will therefore need to behave in a professional and responsible manner.

Why become an Isle of Wight Youth Councillor or MYP?

Becoming a Youth Councillor or MYP will give you opportunities to:

- Represent young people and give their views at public meetings.
- Raise the profile of young people in your area.
- · Learn more about your community.
- Attend training courses and conferences as appropriate.
- Gain valuable experience and life skills which can be added to your CV when you are applying for work or training in the future.
- · Learn about local government and the decision making process.
- Become involved in community work.

1. How do I apply?

Read all the information in this pack to make sure you know what will be involved and expected of you before you decide that you want to apply.

2. Complete the following forms in this pack:

- Application form.
- · Medical consent form.
- Photograph consent.
- Manifesto

If you are under 16, your parent/guardian will need to read this information as well, because their signature is needed on both the medical and photograph consent forms.
